Creating a Dazzling Landscape from Spring through Fall

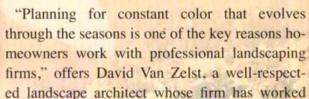

While some groundcovers and foliage will remain at their peak throughout the growing seasons, many colorful flowers will come and go, giving way to new varieties from one month to the next.

Your spring garden, for example, may come to life with tulips, crocus and other bulbs, golden forsythia and flowering shrubs. In summer, perennials of all shapes, sizes and hues take center stage, bringing a fresh, vivid palette to the

> landscape. As trees fill out, areas that might have been sunny just weeks before will best support hostas, astilbes and other shade-loving plants. Finally, as the days grow shorter and fall is on the horizon, late-season plants in rich autumn hues can carry your landscape through the first frost.
